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INFORMING THE OST SYSTEM IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA Perspectives from Parents and Youth

Key Insights from Parents

- Safe and engaging programs are priorities. More than half of parents identified safety as one of the most important components of OST programs (78%). Parents also want programs that reflect child's interests (53%), including arts and sports.
- Transportation, affordability, and lack of information are top challenges to OST participation. More than half of parents identified a lack of transportation as a primary challenge (53%).
- Elementary school parents prefer supervised program transportation; middle grades parents also support public transit as an option. 55% of middle school parents said public transit was a good option, compared to 13% of elementary school parents.
- Parents prefer to receive information about programs from their child's school and to register their child in person. 76% of parents identified schools as their preferred source of information about programs.

Key Insights from Youth

- Youth want to build skills in OST programs. The top three skill areas identified by youth are arts (51%), sports (46%), and career/vocational (42%).
- Middle and high school youth want programs that offer college exploration and career exploration/training. 58% of youth reported "a lot" of interest in college exploration, and 55% of youth expressed "a lot" of interest in career exploration/training.
- Middle and high school youth want to participate in sports and recreational activities.
 55% of middle and high school youth reported "a lot" of interest in sports, and 50% reported "a lot" of interest in recreational activities.
- Middle and high school youth want to attend OST programs a few days a week—but not every day. Youth are more likely to want to participate in summer programs 5 days a week than afterschool programs (26% compared to 9%).

Recommendations

1. Ensure that OST programs take place in a safe environment and clean facilities.



2. Promote activities that reflect the interests of youth, including sports and arts programming and, for older youth, career and college programming.



3. Explore the feasibility of supporting program transportation—and of supporting program sites close to public transit for middle and high school students.



4. Ensure that schools have comprehensive and current information about available afterschool and summer program opportunities and disseminate that information to families.



5. Continue to build awareness of the Learn24 website among families and schools.

LEARN (24)

The OST Office partnered with Policy Studies Associates and Parents Amplifying Voices in Education (PAVE) to develop, administer, and analyze youth and parent surveys. Youth and parent voices captured through the surveys will help to inform the development of Learn24. Insights and recommendations presented here are based on perspectives collected from 1,207 parents of children in grades PreK-8, and from 227 youth in middle and high school in Spring and Summer 2018.



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INFORMING LEARN24: VOICES OF PARENTS AND YOUTH

Over the last two years, the District of Columbia has aligned policy, resources, and research to strengthen its network of out-of-school time (OST) services. OST programs include afterschool, before and summer programs for children and youth. In 2017, the District of Columbia (D.C.) Office of the Deputy Mayor for Education (DME) launched the Office of Out of School Time Grants and Youth Outcomes (OST Office). The OST Office was created by the Office of Out of School Time Grants and Youth Outcomes Establishment Act of 2016 to manage strategic planning, implementation, and data analysis to build the quality, and increase the coordination, of OST programs across D.C. In 2018, the DME and the OST Office introduced the Learn24 network of afterschool and summer programs supported by the District of Columbia. The network is designed to ensure that children and youth have access to high-quality educational and enrichment activities outside of the school day. In addition, the Commission on Out of School Time Grants and Youth Outcomes (OST Commission) is charged with drafting a strategic plan to ensure equitable access to programs, developing recommendations and policies to achieve the strategic plan, and overseeing the OST Office.

The OST Office and OST Commission committed to ensuring that the voices of parents¹ and youth were represented in informing the development of a system of OST services. In a collaborative effort in 2018, Policy Studies Associates (PSA) developed survey instruments and analyzed data collected by the OST Office and by Parents Amplifying Voices in Education (PAVE). These surveys are part of a comprehensive needs assessment and build on an October 2017 report by the D.C. Policy Center that examined the supply and need for OST programming capacity in D.C.²

This report summarizes survey findings and presents recommendations based on the analysis of data collected from parents of children in grades pre-K-8 and from youth in grades 6-12, from March through July 2018.

Methodology

The goal for both parent and youth surveys was to collect feedback across the eight D.C. Wards and across grades. An aim was also to include the voices of families both currently engaged and not engaged in the D.C. OST system.

PSA worked collaboratively with the OST Office and PAVE in the design and administration of parent and youth surveys. PSA researchers developed and supported the administration of the parent and youth surveys

and analyzed the results. PAVE administered the parent survey. The OST Office coordinated the administration of the youth survey and entered survey responses into an online database.

Survey respondents were not drawn from a random sample of D.C. residents, but rather represent a convenience sample of residents within parameters described below.

Parent survey. The survey was designed, with input from the OST Office, to explore key questions related to planning an OST system that reflects the needs of families. It also examined in greater depth parent experiences with the OST system discussed in the D.C. Policy Center report.

The OST Office contracted with PAVE to administer the parent needs assessment survey. A nonprofit organization dedicated to elevating parent voice in education, PAVE engaged paid parent leaders to canvass in neighborhoods throughout D.C. PSA and PAVE jointly trained these parent leaders to ensure understanding of the information needs and the canvassing processes.

PAVE established target numbers of parents to complete the survey in each D.C. Ward, and identified canvassing spots at locations including Metro stops, grocery stores, and community centers. Some PAVE canvassers were bilingual in Spanish, and a translated survey was available to facilitate administration to Spanish-speaking parents.

Parents of children in grades preK-8 answered questions about...

- OST program features and activities
- Receiving information about OST programs
- Registering for OST programs
- Transportation, both to and from the program
- Challenges to participation in OST programming

The OST Office wanted to capture parent perspectives on afterschool and summer programs without overburdening survey respondents. Therefore, parents were asked to provide feedback on either afterschool or summer OST programs. Parents were also asked to focus on the experiences of their oldest child in pre-K to grade 8. Parents or guardians of a child in pre-K through grade 8 in D.C. were eligible to respond.

Between March and June of 2018, parents completed 1,207 surveys: 55 percent focused on afterschool programs and 45 percent focused on summer programs. Three percent of the surveys (36 surveys) were completed using the Spanish translation.

Surveyed parents represented Wards across D.C., with the largest proportion of respondents residing in Ward 7 (19 percent), Ward 8 (16 percent), and Ward 1 (16 percent). Eighty-five percent of parents said that their child attended school in the same Ward in which they lived. Responding parents also represented the full range of grades pre-K through 8, and with students enrolled in both D.C. Public Schools (43 percent) and public charter schools (54 percent). A majority were engaged in OST programming in some capacity: 75 percent reported that their child was enrolled in an afterschool program, and 90 percent planned to enroll their child in summer programming.

Youth survey. Developed by the PSA research team with input from the OST Office, the youth survey was administered between May and July 2018.

The OST Office distributed the online survey, in both English and Spanish, to people and organizations who subscribe to the Learn24 e-newsletter. The OST Office also distributed the online survey link to communication partners including OST-and youth-related programs in D.C. A small number of those partners and programs administered paper copies of the survey to their participants. In addition, the OST Office engaged in limited survey canvassing at D.C. Public Libraries in Wards 1, 7, and 8 and conducted outreach at cooperating special events attended by youth in Grades 6 to 12. Through these efforts, youth completed 227 surveys.

Youth in grades 6-12 answered questions about desired...

- OST program features
- OST program activities
- Skill development
- Frequency of OST program participation

Responding youth reported attending 71 different schools,

lived throughout D.C., and were fairly evenly distributed across all grades in middle and high school. Approximately a third (31 percent) reported attending an afterschool program (higher than the national average of 18 percent).³ Sixty-one percent reported plans to attend a summer program.⁴

Analytic approach. The PSA research team examined the overall pattern in responses for each parent and youth survey question, as well as patterns in responses by:

- Whether the focus was on afterschool programs or summer programs (parent survey only)
- Grade level
- Ward of residence
- Whether respondents live in a zip code with median family income below/above the D.C. median

This report focuses on the top priorities for OST programs expressed by parents and youth, based on the proportion of respondents selecting each response choice on the survey, and focusing on responses selected by at least 25 percent of respondents. This report also focuses on the overall pattern of responses, highlighting differences between afterschool and summer programs, grade level, Ward of residence, or neighborhood income, only in those few cases where these distinctions were notable.

Complete tables of frequencies for all parent and youth survey items, overall and for each analytic group, are included in the appendix. Reported differences or rankings in the percentage of respondents who selected specific responses were not tested for statistical significance.

The percentages presented in text, exhibits, and the appendix do not always equal 100. Some questions asked parents to select one option that best matched their preference, while other questions asked parents to select up to three responses. For each question, between 20 and 73 percent of parents selected more responses than required. To maximize responses, all data from the parent survey are included in analysis, regardless of whether a respondent selected more options than instructed. One youth survey question also asked respondents to select three choices. Since the online youth survey did not allow for more than three responses, the OST Office could not enter data into the system for youth who completed the survey by paper and selected more than the allowable number of responses. These responses were dropped, resulting in a 21 percent non-response rate for this question.

PARENT PERSPECTIVES ON OST

Parents of children in grades preK-8...

- Prioritize program safety
- Seek activities that reflect youth interests and are engaging; sports and arts activities are in high demand
- Prefer supervised means of transportation, including program-provided transportation and transportation by parents or other trusted adults
- Want to receive information about OST programs from schools, and most prefer in-person registration methods

Parents of middle school youth...

Support public transportation as an option for youth to get to OST programs

A safe and engaging environment is at the core of parent priorities for


OST. More than half of parents of children in grades preK-8 indicated that the features most important to them in selecting an OST program were a safe environment (78 percent) and their child's interests (53 percent). More than a quarter of parents identified facility cleanliness and quality of activities as among the most important features.

Parents of elementary and middle grades children want OST programs that include arts and sports. Parents were asked to suggest one activity they would most like to have available to their child in an OST program. The word cloud below displays parents' responses.

Categorized, the most commonly desired activities involved arts (including music, dance, and band) (29 percent of parents), and sports (including football, basketball, and cheerleading) (26 percent), perhaps reflecting a desire for enrichment opportunities with limited time allotted during a typical school day.

Parent Reports of Desired OST Program Activities



The relative order of parent preference for OST activities was consistent across analytic groups, with one exception. For summer programs, 40 percent of parents listed sports as the most desired activity in a summer program, and 19 percent wanted arts programming. The preferences were reversed for afterschool: 38 percent of parents desired arts programming, and 15 percent sports.

Parents experience transportation, information, and financial challenges in enrolling children in OST. The D.C. Policy

Center's October 2017 needs assessment report highlighted gaps in availability of subsidized OST programming in D.C. and noted the difficulty parents faced in finding timely information about programs and resolving transportation and logistical challenges.

Reinforcing these challenges, in the parent survey, more than half (53 percent) identified the lack of transportation options as a primary challenge to finding an OST program. More than a third reported that their desired program was Top three challenges to OST participation, according to parents

not affordable (45 percent) and that parents lacked information on programs (37 percent).

Elementary school parents prefer supervised OST transportation options, while middle grades parents also support public transit. More than half of parents of elementary grades students indicated a preference for driving—or having someone the parent knows—drive the child, particularly after the program (55 percent to the program, 73 percent after). Elementary-

grades parents would also like OST programs to offer transportation, both to and after the program (55 and 56 percent respectively).

A majority of middle school parents were comfortable with public transit as an option, both to the program and after the program (55 percent and 54 percent, respectively). Similar to elementary parents, middle school parents also identified driving (56 percent) and program-provided transportation (50 percent) as preferred options after the program. Fewer than half preferred those as options for the student getting to the program.

Parents want to receive information about OST programs from

their child's school. Parents can **receive information** about programs from a variety of sources, including their child's school, social media, and local fairs or program showcases. Parents overwhelmingly selected their child's school as the preferred source of information (76 percent).



Social media was the second most frequently preferred source of information, with about half as many parents identifying this option (37 percent), followed by websites, such as the Learn24 website (30 percent).



Parents were also asked about their preferred way to **register for OST programs**. The most frequently selected way to register children for programs was in person (59 percent) followed by online (40 percent).

YOUTH PERSPECTIVES ON OST

Youth in grades 6-12...

- Value program safety
- Seek activities that appeal to their interests, including college and career exploration
- Want to develop skills in arts and sports
- Want to attend an OST program weekly, but not every day

Young people want a safe OST environment. Reinforcing parent priorities for OST, when asked to pick the top three features that would prompt them to give "5 stars out of 5" to an afterschool or summer program, middle and high school youth (grades 6-12) most frequently reported feeling safe (51 percent), liking the activities (32 percent), and having good snacks/food (30 percent). A quarter or more of youth also reported that they would rate a program highly if they learned job skills, enjoyed the field trips, could choose from many activities, or attended the program with their friends.

Middle and high school youth want a wide variety of OST activities, including college and career exploration. When asked to identify how much they were interested in certain OST activities, youth most frequently reported "a lot" of interest in college exploration and career exploration/training (58 and 55 percent, respectively); sports (55 percent); and recreational activities (50 percent). More than a quarter of youth also expressed "a lot" of interest in performing arts (44 percent); health/nutrition/cooking (42 percent); visual arts (42 percent); STEM (41 percent); and community service

(40 percent). The other two activity options, mentoring (32 percent) and tutoring/academic support (24 percent), had the fewest number of youth indicating "a lot" of interest.

Middle and high school youth also listed up to three skills they wanted to develop when not in school. The PSA research team organized the write-in responses into categories. Skill development priorities were closely aligned with the activity preferences described above: 51 percent of youth wanted to develop art skills (e.g., visual arts and singing), 46 percent wanted to develop skills in sports, and 42 percent wanted to develop career and vocational skills.



Youth want to attend OST programs a few days a week. Middle and high school

youth often have competing interests that can affect OST participation (e.g., school activities, work,

babysitting younger siblings). Perhaps reflecting these responsibilities, relatively few youth wanted to attend an afterschool program five days a week (9 percent), although a greater proportion said they would attend a summer program at this frequency (26 percent). The most commonly selected frequency of preferred participation was 1-2 days per week for afterschool programs (47 percent), and 3-4 days per week for summer programs (31 percent).



RECOMMENDATIONS FOR LEARN24

Parents of elementary and middle grades youth, and youth in middle and high school, provided insights into their preferences and priorities for an OST system in D.C. in needs assessment surveys administered from March to July 2018. These survey findings provide guidance for the OST Office and OST Commission to consider in refining approaches that respond to the needs and desires of families in D.C.

Based on these survey results, the PSA research team offers the following suggestions to support program improvement and increase participation in afterschool and summer programs:

- 1. Ensure that programs take place in a safe environment and clean facilities.
- 2. Promote activities that reflect the interests of children and youth, including sports and arts programming, and, for older youth, career- and college- focused programming.
- 3. Explore the feasibility of supporting transportation to and from programs—and of identifying program sites located close to public transportation for programs serving middle and high school students—to encourage greater OST participation.
- 4. Ensure that schools have comprehensive and current information about available afterschool and summer program opportunities, and that schools disseminate that information to families.
- 5. Continue to build awareness of the Learn24 website among both families and schools as a program information resource.












